Predator Free NZ workshop

We recently attended a very worthwhile workshop facilitated by Predator Free NZ. All the guest speakers were so knowledgeable and there are some exciting new developments in the predator control space! There were plenty of tips on how to best utilise our existing hardware and we'll be implementing some of them over time.

Abby, our Operations Manager, and Jenny, our Awaroa trapping line leader, were on a stall during break times to chat with attendees about our current A24 trap configuration trial. There were lots of groups and organisations present so it was a great opportunity to network and learn new things.


Predator Control

Trapping Update

Volunteers have been busy trapping with a total of 588 mustelids and 13,880 rats removed from our wooden box traps since October 2010.

We also have a network of Goodnature A24 traps in place. We are starting to utilise some technology to properly record the strikes from these traps. Some traps are fitted with 'Chirps' and these record the detailed strike/kill information which uploads via bluetooth when a trap location is visited. This uploaded data, accessible via the Goodnature app, indicates there was 96 strikes recorded on our chirps over December 2023!

We are always learning about these traps and optimising our processes.

Our Planting Project

We have had another planting maintenance day and our trees are looking fantastic. The growth from previous years is becoming really visible as you walk this part of the coastal track.
